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## Functions of community health

Some of the factors that define the health community include the social and economic environment and physical environment, as shown by the World Health Organization. The WHO recommends that people are not able to control much of their defining health. An example of how the economic environment affects the health of the community is income and social status. According to the WHO, higher incomes and social statuses are linked to better health. Furthermore, the greater the difference between the richest and poorest people in a community, the greater the difference in their health. Social support networks also have an impact on the health of the community, as greater support for family and friends contributes to better health. Factors affecting community health in the physical environment include safe drinking water, clean air, safe workplaces and adequate housing. Genetic makeup plays a role in determining the life span of a person and the likelihood of developing certain diseases. Finally, individual behaviors, such as maintaining a healthy diet and exercise routine, contribute to the health of the community. The WHO Health Impact Assessment shows evidence of the determinants of community health. For example, according to the WHO, evidence on the impacts on the physical environment includes the number of motor vehicle accidents, pollution caused by fossil fuels, homelessness and urbanisation of communities. But the roles of many special nurses - including the community health nurses... have been significantly expanded. CHRNs operate in a wide range of administrative, clinical and non-patient care. The CH RN is always responsible for medical guidance, general health and health care for communities and certain patient groups. The CH RN will begin his career with a bachelor's degree in community or public health nursing. Many CH RNs, especially higher-level management roles, have master's degree. CH programs include basic courses as well as topics such as advanced statistics, community health issues, advanced family health, public health theory and vulnerable populations. The aim of the courses is to address the principles of community health care, which are promoting a healthy life, preventing health problems, treating disorders, rehabilitation, evaluation and research. In RN hospital settings, 1-6 patients tend to have trouble, while CH RN practice involves the wider community. For example, it may carry out an assessment at Community level to assess issues such as hygiene, maternal-child health, shortcomings in medical care or the possibility of an outbreak of infectious diseases. Other CHRNs are working with hospitals, law enforcement and disaster management professionals to plan potential emergency scenarios that could affect the community. CHRNs can also work in the field of epidemiology or disease prevention. CHRNs still work in public health departments, but they can also be employed by schools, penitentiary institutions, hospitals, occupational health agencies, residential institutions and nursing education programmes. A public health nurse can provide direct services to the community, such as operating an immunisation clinic.
